The Gospel contains three important teachings of Jesus. The first is the need to store up treasure in heaven, and we do this, it seems, through detachment from earthly things and by giving alms to those in need. The second concerns the need to be prepared for the coming of the Son of Man. The third is about those called to govern and care for the family of God. Jesus appointed Peter as the royal steward of his kingdom. Peter and his successors are to be faithful and prudent stewards who give the servants their food – the Eucharist – at the proper time.

As Jesus and his disciples journey to Jerusalem, Jesus teaches that all of his disciples, as servants of the Lord, must be ready and vigilant at all times. “Gird your loins” refers to how ancient peoples secured a garment, such as a long robe or tunic, around the waist. It was done before certain types of work or for battle, since it allowed a person to have greater freedom of movement. It is an expression that means: “prepare yourself for something difficult or challenging.” A Christian must be actively vigilant, focusing his or her faith beyond this life.

How am I serving my household? Am I feeding my family materially and spiritually? Am I an example of faithfulness and trust (hope) in the Lord? What promises of the Lord do I have before my eyes?

On August 15 the Church celebrates the Feast Day of the Assumption of Our Lady when according to our faith, the Holy Mother, "having completed her course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory".

Although defined as an article of faith by Pope Pius XII, the Assumption of Our Lady into heaven has been accepted from back to the earliest of Christian times.

The Assumption signals the end of Mary's earthly life and marks her return to heaven to be reunited with Jesus. While the bodies of both Jesus and Mary are now in heaven, there is a difference between the Assumption and the Resurrection. Where Jesus arose from the tomb and ascended into heaven by his own power, Mary's body was taken up to heaven by the power of her Son. For this reason we use different words to describe each event. One is the Ascension of Christ and the other, the Assumption of Mary.

This solemnity was first called the Feast of Mary, Mother of God. Later, its name in the East carried over: the Dormition (or Falling Asleep) of Mary. In the West, it became known as the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This holy day celebrates the fact that Mary's Assumption is "a pledge of the future participation of the members of the mystical Body of Christ in the paschal glory of the Risen Christ." It shows that the Lord "reserves a munificent reward for his humble Servant because of her faithful cooperation with the divine plan, which is a destiny of fullness, happiness, glorification of her immaculate soul, her virginal body, perfect configuration to her Risen Son."

St. Michael's will celebrate this holy day of obligation Mass on Friday at 7 pm.

Divine Mercy has Mass that day at 8:30 am and 7 pm.
